LABOR ATTACKED IN 2012-2013

The 2012-2013 time period should be remembered as a time when labor was under attack, particularly the public sector unions.

Pension Referendum

In 2012, both chambers voted to put a constitutional amendment referendum on the ballot. HJRCA 49 stated that no bill, ordinance, action, or rule that provides for a benefit increase under any pension or retirement system of the state, local government, or school district shall be valid without 3/5 of its governing body approving of the increase. HJRCA 49 further states that if the Governor vetoes any bill that has met the 3/5 threshold, it would take two-thirds majority vote of each chamber in the General Assembly to override the veto.

The Constitutional Amendment would have become part of the full Illinois Constitution if approved by either three-fifths of those voting on the question in November or a majority of those voting in the election. It was resoundingly defeated by the people of Illinois in the General Election of 2012.

Pension Theft

At the end of 2013, the General Assembly passed SB 1, and Governor Quinn signed legislation (PA 98-599) that will make it impossible for retirees to keep up with the rising cost-of-living in retirement. It unconstitutionally slashes COLAs by using a destructive formula and imposing COLA holidays of up to five years. Combined, these two COLA cuts erode the value of a person's pension by nearly one-third after 20 years in retirement—and deprive retirees of thousands of dollars in income just in the next five years.

Public Employee Collective Bargaining

With the passage of SB 1556, there is no longer a requirement that an individual be engaged in management a substantial amount of time or as a major function of their employment to qualify as a "manager." Thus employees whose primary responsibilities are not managerial would be denied the right to collectively bargain for better working conditions.

It took the Governor's office and the rest of the constitutional officers approximately six times over the course of two years to pass SB 1556.

Gaming

The General Assembly approved an expansion of gaming in Illinois with SB 1849. It created five new casinos including a land-based casino in Chicago. Casinos would also be located in Rockford, Danville, Park City and the south suburbs. It also allows for slot machines at horse racing tracks. Governor Quinn issued a total veto.

Hydraulic Fracturing Regulation Passes

The Illinois General Assembly passed the strictest regulations on hydraulic fracturing, a process to extract natural gas and oil out of shale deposits. Most of the work will be done in southern Illinois shale deposits. It is estimated that the bill will create tens of thousands of good, high paying jobs for Illinois residents. In addition it will produce millions of dollars in new state revenue. The hope is that by producing domestic sources of natural gas and oil, we will have to rely less on foreign sources.

Unemployment Insurance

HB 3125 was passed and signed, giving IDES subpoena power to inspect the records of businesses who knowingly refuse to file UI wage reports which will assist IDES in pursuing independent contractor violations. Pursuant to federal funding, specifies a veteran outreach officer in each full service IDES offices and requires State contractors (other than construction contractors) to post job vacancies on www.IllinoisJobLink.com.

Building Trades

The building trades did see some success in passage of a number of bills. HB 922 passed in 2013 to require certified payrolls to be kept for five years (was three). HB 923 in 2013 required contractors to file notification of any payment to an "independent contractor". We continue to seek a statewide responsible bidder bill, which in its current form is HB 924.

Explanation of Voting Record

This document represents the official Voting Record of Illinois legislators on issues of importance to working families and their unions during 2012-2013. Illinois lawmakers are rated on their votes on key labor issues. This record will become the basis for our future political activity.

The current make up of the Illinois Senate is 40 Democrats and 19 Republicans. In the Illinois House there are 71 Democrats and 47 Republicans.

The Illinois delegation in the U.S. House of Representatives currently includes 6 Republicans and 12 Democrats. Illinois' two U.S. Senate seats are held by Sen. Dick Durbin (D) and Sen. Mark Kirk (R).

This voting record is compiled on behalf of the Executive Board of the Illinois AFL-CIO. The Illinois AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Education (COPE) will meet prior to both the primary and general elections and will make endorsement recommendations to the Executive Board. This record will play an important role in the endorsement process for all incumbents running for re-election or for election to another office. Non-incumbents are asked to complete a questionnaire and will be recommended by Congressional District COPE Committees on the basis of their questionnaire responses and interviews.

We wish to extend our appreciation to all incumbent lawmakers, Democrat and Republican, who supported working families. In making recommendations for endorsement, the legislator's overall record, including previous legislative sessions, may be considered.

A "Yes" vote on a favorable bill and "No" or "Present" (P) votes on unfavorable bills are considered "Right" (R). Conversely, "No" or "Present" (P) votes on unfavorable bills are considered "Wrong" (W). In the records of Illinois lawmakers, failing to vote (A,E, or NV) to pass an unfavorable bill is "Right" and failing to vote to pass a favorable bill is "Wrong". Each bill used in tabulating voting records is assigned a "weight" relative to the importance of the legislation.

98TH ILLINOIS SENATE BILLS - 2013

1. **SB 1 - Unconstitutional Pension Cuts** **Madigan/Cullerton - OPPOSE**

Unilaterally and illegally diminishes benefits for all state retirement systems (except the Judges'), even though the Illinois Constitution specifically states that pension benefits are a contractual right that cannot be diminished or impaired. The legislation makes it impossible for retirees to keep up with rising cost-of-living in retirement. It unconstitutionally slashes COLAs by using a destructive formula and imposing COLA holidays of up to five years. Combined, these two COLA cuts erode the value of a person's pension by nearly one-third after 20 years in retirement—and deprive retirees of thousands of dollars in income just in the next five years. **Passed House 62-53-1. Passed Senate 30-24-3.**

2. **SB 10 - Marriage Equality** **Steans/Harris - SUPPORT**

Allows for same sex couples to be legally married in Illinois. Allows people in a same sex marriage to be eligible for medicare, social security, family and medical leave, equal insurance coverage and other federal and State benefits of their spouse. **Passed Senate 34-21-2. Passed House 61-54-2.**

3. **SB 20 - Capitol Projects** **Hutchinson/Bradley - SUPPORT**

Large projects bill that authorized: Peotone Airport, Cronus Fertilizer plant, Brownfields redevelopment on Chicago south side, DePaul Blue Demon arena construction at McPier, and PLA's on LUST fund projects. **Passed Senate 38-17-2. Passed House 81-35-1.**

4. **SB 26 - Medicaid Expansion** **Steans/Feigenholz - SUPPORT**

Will make Medicaid coverage available to adults with annual income below 138 percent of the federal poverty line, which is \$15,860 for individuals and \$21,408 for couples. The measure is expected to enroll 342,000 people by 2017. **Passed House 63-55-0. Passed Senate 39-20-0.**

5. **SB 1715 - Hydraulic Fracturing** **Frerichs/Bradley - SUPPORT**

Authorizes and regulates hydraulic fracturing, a process to extract natural gas and oil out of shale deposits. Most work will be done in southern Illinois shale deposits. Estimated to create tens of thousands of good, high paying jobs for Illinois residents. **Passed House 108-9-0. Passed Senate 52-3-4.**

6. **SB 1739 - Gaming** **Link/Rita - SUPPORT**

Allows five new casinos, including one in Chicago. Additionally, it allows betting games at horse-racing tracks, Midway and O'Hare airports. **Passed Senate 32-20-1. No vote in House.**

7. **SB 2196 - U of I Independent School of Labor** **Biss/Madigan - SUPPORT**

The University of Illinois Provost attempted to move the School of Labor into the School of Business or Liberal Arts. The School of Labor was created by an act of the General Assembly in 1945. It was created and built by the union movement. This legislation requires the university board of trustees to keep the School of Labor an independent and autonomous entity. **Passed House 92-24-1. Passed Senate 43-12-0.**

8. **HB 1 - Medical Marijuana Jobs Bill** **Lang/Haine - SUPPORT**

Creates a highly regulated, very limited four-year medical cannabis pilot program. Patients with specified debilitating conditions and a Department of Public Health-issued registry identification card could possess a limited amount of cannabis for their medical use. Patients and caregivers could not cultivate the cannabis, and instead would obtain it from one of up to 60 highly regulated dispensing organizations (staffed by union members). Those dispensaries would in turn obtain the cannabis and edible products with cannabis from one of up to 22 cultivation centers. **Passed House 61-57-0. Passed Senate 35-21-0.**

9. **HB 922 - Construction Payroll** **Hurley/Holmes - SUPPORT**

Requires construction contractors to keep certified payrolls for 5 years (was 3). **Passed House 75-42-0. Passed Senate 40-10-0.**

10. **HB 923 - Construction Contractor Transparency** **Hoffman/Noland - SUPPORT**

Requires contractors for which construction services are performed by an individual, sole proprietor, or partnership to report to the Department of Labor all payments made to those entities if the recipient of the payment is not classified as an employee. **Passed House 72-44-0. Passed Senate 35-19-2.**

11. **HB 1375 - Fire Fighter Survivor Benefits** **Beiser/Kotowski - SUPPORT**

In certain cases where a deceased firefighter left a surviving minor child but no surviving spouse, increases the pension payable to the guardian of the child from 12% to 20% of the firefighter's monthly salary. **Passed House 111-0. Passed Senate 55-0.**

12. **HB 2418 - Expanded Voting Rights** **Currie/Harmon - SUPPORT**

Omnibus Elections Bill of 2013. Allows for online voter registration for the first time in Illinois. **Passed House 66-49-2. Passed Senate 32-20-3.**

13. **HB 3063 - Teacher Evaluation** **Roth/Bertino-Tarrant - SUPPORT**

Allows a new principal to evaluate all staff upon his/her first year, but it would reset the clock from the date of the new principal's evaluation to two years for tenured teachers rated "Excellent" or "Proficient." **Passed House 88-22-0. Passed Senate 43-12-0.**

97TH ILLINOIS SENATE BILLS - 2012

**1. SB 957 - Immigrant Drivers License
Cullerton/Acevedo - SUPPORT**

Allows for a temporary license (3 years), after immigrant drivers get tested on their driving skills and the rules of the road along with purchase of automobile insurance. **Passed House 65-46-0. Passed Senate 41-14-0.**

**2. SB 1313 - State Retiree Health Care
Schoenberg/Madigan - OPPOSE**

Eliminates subsidy for state employee retiree health care. **Passed House 74-43-0. Passed Senate 31-20-1.**

**3. SB 1556 - Collective Bargaining Rights
Cullerton/Currie - OPPOSE**

Collective Bargaining rights stripped from some state workers. **Passed House 62-52-1. Passed Senate 31-20.**

**4. SB 1849 - Gaming
Link/Lang - SUPPORT**

Creates a Chicago casino with 4,000 gambling posts such as slot machines or seats at blackjack tables and adds riverboat casinos in Danville, Park City, Rockford, and in Chicago's south suburbs. Each of the new boats and the ten existing ones could have 1,600 positions (was 1,200). Horse racing tracks also will be able to operate slot machines. **Passed House 69-47-2. Passed Senate 30-26-3.**

**5. SB 2194 - Cigarette Tax Increase
Schoenberg/Currie - SUPPORT**

Increases cigarette tax \$1 per pack, dedicated to Medicaid payment. **Passed House 60-52-0. Passed Senate 31-27-0.**

**6. SB 2643 - Responsible Bidder
Noland/Lilly - SUPPORT**

Requires bidders on public works projects to be a "responsible bidder". Requires all bids to contain a breakdown of all hours worked by a journeyman or apprentice. **Passed Senate 32-18. No vote in House.**

**7. SB 3210 - Not For Profit Property Leasing
Koehler/Gordon - SUPPORT**

Construction stimulus bill that would allow tax-exempt entities to lease their property for private development. **Passed Senate 39-14-0. No vote in House.**

**8. SB 3318 - Illiana
Hutchinson/DeLuca - SUPPORT**

Quick take authority for Illiana projects. **Passed House 61-57-0. Passed Senate 44-8-0.**

**9. SB 3518 - Charity Protections
Mulroe/Moffitt - SUPPORT**

No county or municipality may prohibit a charitable organization from soliciting for charitable purposes, including solicitations taking place on public roadways from passing motorists. Firefighters can "pass the boot". **Passed House 110-0-1. Passed Senate 41-9-1.**

**10. SB 3564 - Due Process on Closure Decisions
Forby - SUPPORT**

The General Assembly shall vote by joint resolution to uphold or overturn the opinion filed by COGFA on closure of a state facility. **Failed in Senate 29-23-1**

**11. SB 3695 - Prevailing Wage Improvements
Frerichs/Hernandez - SUPPORT**

Requires contractors to use the Illinois Department of Labor form when submitting PWA certified payroll records and requires amongst other information, the inclusion of the worker's hours worked, wage rate, overtime wage rate, fringe benefit rates, name and address of each fringe benefit rates. Also requires contractors to submit the annual costs of any fringe benefit provided to their employees. **Passed Senate 30-27-0. No vote in House.**

**12. SB 3766 - Leucadia
Trotter/Lyons - SUPPORT**

Ensures that the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) cannot stop the Leucadia/Chicago Clean Energy project. Requires the law to be implemented as written. **Passed House 60-50-5. Passed Senate 35-16-0.**

**13. HB 1447 - Pension Cuts
Burke/Cullerton - OPPOSE**

Affects the State Employee Retirement System and General Assembly Retirement System. Contained COLA reductions. Provides a choice for other individuals from lowering their COLA and having access to retiree health insurance and future salary increases OR maintaining current benefits but forfeiting your access to retiree health insurance and future salary increases. Retirees would have to choose between lowering COLA or forfeiting health insurance. **Passed Senate 30-24-1. No vote in House.**

**14. HB 4177 - Home Care Workers Collective
Bargaining
Bradley/Hunter - SUPPORT**

Preserves the collective bargaining rights for DHS's home care and home health workers who function as personal care attendants, personal assistants, and individual maintenance home health workers and who work under the Home Services Program under Section 3 of the Disabled Persons Rehabilitation Act. **Passed House 63-49-1. Passed Senate 37-15-0. Concurrence vote was 109-0.**

**15. HJRCA 49 - Super Majority Pension Changes
Madigan/Cullerton - OPPOSE**

Requires 3/5 vote of any governing body that seeks to pass a pension enhancement. **Passed House 113-0-0. Passed Senate 51-2-0.**

**4. SB 957 - Immigrant Temporary Drivers License
Cullerton/Acevedo - SUPPORT**

Allows for a temporary license (3 years), after immigrant

drivers get tested on their driving skills and on rules of the road along with purchase of automobile insurance. *Passed House 65-46-0. Passed Senate 41-14-0.*

**5. SB 1313 - State Employee Retiree Health Care
Schoenberg/Madigan - OPPOSE**

Eliminates subsidy for state employee retiree health care. *Passed House 74-43-0. Passed Senate 31-20-1.*

**6. SB 1849 - Gaming
Link/Lang - SUPPORT**

Creates a Chicago casino with 4,000 gambling posts such as slot machines or seats at blackjack tables and adds riverboat casinos in Danville, Park City, Rockford, and in Chicago's south suburbs. Each of the new boats and the ten existing ones could have 1,600 positions (was 1,200). Horse racing tracks also will be able to operate slot machines. *Passed House 69-47-2. Passed Senate 30-26-3.*

**7. SB 2194 - Cigarette Tax Increase
Schoenberg/Currie - SUPPORT**

Increases cigarette tax \$1 per pack, dedicated to Medicaid payments. *Passed House 60-52-0. Passed Senate 31-27-0.*

**8. SB 3318 - Illiana
Hutchinson/DeLuca - SUPPORT**

Quick take authority for Illiana projects. *Passed House 61-57-0. Passed Senate 44-8-0.*

**9. SB 3766 - Leucadia
Trotter/Lyons - SUPPORT**

Ensures that the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) cannot kill the Leucadia/Chicago Clean Energy project. Requires the law to be implemented as written. *Passed House 60-50-5. Passed Senate 35-16-0.*

**10. HJR 45 - Collective Bargaining General Assembly
Madigan/Cullerton - OPPOSE**

Would not appropriate any money for wage increases, essentially giving legislators the authority to set wages, which has been established by courts as a mandatory subject of collective bargaining. *Passed House 84-29-0. Did not receive a vote in the Senate.*

**11. HJRCA 49 - Super Majority Pension Improvements
Madigan/Cullerton - OPPOSE**

Requires 3/5 vote of any governing body that seeks to pass a pension enhancement. *Passed House 113-0-0. Passed Senate 51-2-0.*

3. Federal Pay Freeze (H.R. 273)

(George Miller Motion to Recommit)
Labor's position: Support

5. Job Training Program Consolidation, Final Passage (H.R. 803)
Labor's position: Oppose

The Supporting Knowledge and Investing in Lifelong Skills Act has major implications for the quality of services being delivered to Workforce Investment Act (WIA) eligible participants as well as the overall accountability of the system to disadvantaged persons, dislocated workers, young people, and other populations whose lives have been severely impacted by the Great Recession and continued mass unemployment. **Passed 215-202-16. Roll Call 75, Y=Wrong, No=Right**

6. Hydropower Facility Development (H.R. 678)
Labor's position: Support

Authorizes all Bureau of Reclamation conduit facilities for development under federal reclamation law. **Roll Call 96, Y=Right, N=Wrong**

7. NLRB (Preventing Greater Uncertainty in Labor Management Relations Act) (H.R. 1120)
Labor's position: Oppose

This deceptively-titled bill orders the NLRB to "cease all activity that requires a quorum." It would effectively shut down the agency, denying workers a final, enforceable order if they are illegally fired, retaliated against, denied the right to bargain by their employer, or otherwise had their rights violated. **Passed 219-209-4. Roll Call 101, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

8. Comp Time (H.R. 1406)
Labor's position: Oppose

Bill would allow employer-controlled compensatory time to be substituted for paid overtime. **Passed 223-204-5. Roll Call 137, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

9. ACA Repeal (Bachmann) (H.R. 45)
Labor's position: Oppose

Repeal of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. **Passed 229-195-9. Roll Call 154, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

10. Davis Bacon/Appropriations (King amendment) (H.R. 2216)
Labor's position: Oppose

Amendment prohibits use of funds to administer wage requirements under Davis-Bacon in the Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations bill. **Failed 192-231-10. Roll Call 191, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

11. Deny Funds to USCIS to Implement DACA (King Amendment) (H.R. 2217)

Labor's position: Oppose

Amendment denies funding to United States Citizenship and Immigration Services to implement the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) in the Department of Homeland Security Appropriation. **Passed 224-201-9. Roll Call 208, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

12. Maritime Food Aid (Royce Amendment) (H.R. 1947)
Labor's position: Oppose

Amendment would have gutted the "Food for Peace" program in the Farm Bill. The cuts would have jeopardized the U.S. Maritime industry and the workforce that deliver food through this program around the world. **Failed 203-220-11. Roll Call 262, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

13. Education Law Overhaul (H.R. 5)
Labor's position: Oppose

Bill reverses the historic role of the federal government in protecting equal opportunity and access for all students to a quality education. **Passed 221-207-6. Roll Call 374, Y=Wrong, N=Right**

14. Congressional Approval of Federal Regulations (REINS Act) (H.R. 367)
Labor's position: Oppose

The REINS Act would radically alter the regulatory process by requiring Congress to vote to approve all major rules before they can go into effect. Rules not affirmatively acted on by both the House and the Senate within 70 legislative days would die. Under the REINS Act, politics, not scientific judgment or expertise would dictate all regulatory actions. Corporate opposition and influence would swamp the public's interest and block needed protections. **Passed 232-183-18. Roll Call 445, Y=Wrong, No=Right**

U. S. HOUSE BILLS - 2012

1. Trade: Countervailing Duties (H.R. 4105)

Labor's position: Support

The bill affirms the Commerce Department has the authority to impose countervailing duties on imports from non-market economy countries-including China-that engage in unfair trade practices. **The bill passed 370-39. Roll Call vote 96. Y=R, N=W.**

2. Small Business Startup (H.R. 3606)

Labor's position: Oppose

The "Jumpstart Our Business Startups (JOBS) Act" would reduce critical regulatory protections for investors that are essential to safeguarding the retirement savings of America's workers from fraud and other risks. Weakened securities regulations increase the danger of fraud and speculation. **The bill passed 390-23. Roll Call vote 110. Y=W, N=R..**

3. Fiscal 2013 Budget Resolution (H.C.R. 112)

Labor's position: Oppose

This substitute to the Republican budget resolution offered by Rep. Jim Cooper (R-Tenn.) and Rep. Steve LaTourette (R-Ohio) would make deep cuts in Social Security benefits, cuts to Medicare benefits and Medicaid, offer more tax incentives for U.S. firms to export jobs overseas, tax working Americans' health benefits and lower tax rates for rich people and Wall Street. **Amendment was rejected 38-382. Roll Call vote 145. Y=W, N=R.**

4. Fiscal 2013 Budget Resolution (H.C.R. 112)

Labor's position: Oppose

This Republican budget resolution, crafted by Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.), caps spending and makes major cuts in vital working family programs while cutting tax rates for the richest Americans and Wall Street. Its more egregious provisions include privatizing Medicare, gutting Medicaid and repealing the 2010 health care reform law-the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The Ryan/Republican budget would increase the number of Americans without health insurance by 30 million by repealing the ACA, and its cuts to Medicaid by making it a block grant program would add another 14 to 27 million to the rolls of uninsured rolls. The Ryan/Republican budget also makes it easier to make cuts in Social Security by removing current protections. **Resolution was adopted 228-191. Roll Call vote 151. Y=W, N=R.**

5. Small Business Tax Deduction (H.R. 9)

Labor's position: Oppose

The bill doesn't include a single requirement that businesses create jobs or invest within the United States before qualifying for the new tax deductions. It simply adds even more tax loop holes for businesses to take advantage of. It allows businesses with fewer than 500 employees to deduct 20 percent of their domestic business income. The Joint Committee on Taxation found that H.R. 9's impact on economic growth and jobs is "so small as to be incalculable." The Urban-Brookings Tax Policy Center estimates that nearly half of the tax cut would go to people with incomes more than \$1 million a year. **The bill passed 235-173. Roll Call vote 177. Y=W, N=R.**

6. Swap Dealer Exclusions/Derivatives (H.R. 3336)

Labor's position: Oppose

This bill would exempt certain financial institutions that are major players in derivatives trading from provisions of the 2010 Wall Street reform law that would classify those institutions as a type of derivatives trader known as swap dealers. Derivatives trading was a major cause of the 2008 financial crash. The bill would expand loopholes and exemptions covering derivatives already in the Dodd-Frank Wall Street reform law, and would undermine comprehensive oversight of the derivatives market by financial regulatory agencies. **The bill passed 312-111. Roll Call vote 180. Y=W, N=R.**

7. Budget Sequestration Replacement (H.R. 5652)

Labor's position: Oppose

If Congress cannot agree on a budget deficit package by the end of year, automatic spending cuts known as budget sequestration will take place under provisions of last year's legislation that raised the debt ceiling. H.R. 5652 sponsored by Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) replaces billions in spending cuts outlined in the 2011 legislation with cuts in programs that are helping millions of families survive the worst economic recession since the Great Depression. Forty percent of the total \$324 billion in cuts in mandatory spending comes from programs targeted to low- and moderate-income families, including food stamps, Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program and social services for vulnerable children, elderly & disabled poor. **The bill passed 218-199. Roll call vote 247. Y=W, N=R.**

8. Violence Against Women Act Reauthorization (H.R. 4970)

Labor's position: Support

The Republican bill to reauthorize the 1994 Violence Against Women Act weakens many current protections in the law. It excludes lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) victims, erodes important provisions for immigrant victims' safety and gives abusers additional tools with which to harm victims. **The bill passed 222-205. Roll Call vote 258. N=R, Y=W.**

9. Defense Authorization/PLAs (H.R. 3412)

Labor's position: Oppose

Project Labor Agreements (PLAs) require all construction jobs to be filled by local workers, include diversity requirements, establish wages and work rules covering overtime, working hours and dispute resolution and ensure that safety guidelines on the job site are enforced. They protect taxpayers by eliminating costly delays due to labor conflicts or shortages of skilled workers. Rep. Roscoe Bartlett (R-Md.) offered an amendment to the 2013 Defense Authorization bill that would prohibit PLAs on federal defense construction projects. **Amendment was approved 211-209. Roll Call vote 267. Y=W, N=R.**

10. Defense Authorization/ Privatization (H.R. 3412)

Labor's position: Oppose

Rep. Mike Coffman (R-Colo.) offered an amendment to the Defense Authorization bill that would make it easier to privatize Defense Department work and services now conducted by civilian DOD employees, and make it more difficult to return contracted work and services to the DOD civilian workforce. **Amendment was rejected 209-211. Roll Call vote 272. Y=W, N=R.**

11. Surface Transportation/Buy American (H.R. 4348)

Labor's position: Support

The House and Senate passed different versions of legislation temporarily extending funding for the Surface Transportation Act to keep millions of workers on transportation infrastructure projects employed. Rep. Nick Rahall, (D-W.Va.) offered a motion to instruct House conferees to agree to a Senate-passed Buy American requirements, which generally mandate that the materials for federally-funded highway, transit and rail projects be produced in the United States. **The motion was approved 245-169. Roll Call vote 293. Y=R, N=W.**

U. S. HOUSE BILLS - 2012

12. Fiscal 2013 Military Construction/PLAs (H.R. 5854)

Labor's position: Oppose

A provision in the Military Construction appropriations bill would ban the use of Project Labor Agreements (PLAs). Rep. Michael Grimm (R-N.Y.) offered an amendment to remove the PLA ban from the bill. PLAs require all construction jobs to be filled by local workers and include diversity requirements, establish wages and work rules covering overtime, working hours and dispute resolution and ensure that safety guidelines on the job site are enforced. They protect taxpayers by eliminating costly delays due to labor conflicts or shortages of skilled workers. **Amendment approved 218-198. Roll Call Vote 302. Y=R, N=W.**

13. Fiscal 2013 Military Construction/Davis-Bacon (H.R. 5854)

Labor's position: Oppose

Rep. Trent Franks (R-Ariz.) offered an amendment to H.R. 5854 that would bar the use of funds to enforce Davis-Bacon Act prevailing wage requirements. **Amendment was defeated 180-237. Roll Call Vote 303. Y=W, N=R.**

14. Fiscal 2013 Energy-Water Appropriations/ Davis-Bacon (H.R. 5325)

Labor's position: Oppose

Rep. King Steve (R-Iowa) offered an amendment that would bar the use of funds to enforce Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements. **Amendment was defeated 184-235. Roll Call vote 338. Y=W, N=R.**

15. Fiscal 2013 Surface Transportation/Funding Cuts (H.R. 4348)

Labor's position: Oppose

When the House and Senate versions were in conference, Rep. Paul Broun (R-Ga.), offered a motion to instruct conferees to drastically cut the funding. The cuts focused on mass transit, jeopardizing hundreds of thousands of jobs. **The Broun motion failed 82-323. Roll Call vote 378. Y=W, N=R.**

16. Repeal of Affordable Care Act (H.R. 6079)

Labor's position: Oppose

Shortly after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Affordable Care Act (ACA) was constitutional, congressional Republicans held their 33rd vote to repeal the health care reform law. The ACA improves access to affordable health care coverage, provides consumer protections, and reduces the federal deficit. If repealed, 1.2 million young adults would lose their coverage through their parents' health plan; 2.7 million seniors would pay higher prices for prescription drugs; 44 million seniors would be denied free preventive services; and insurance companies would be allowed to resume denying coverage, limiting care and spending premiums on larger CEO salaries and profits. **It passed 244-185. Roll Call vote 460. Y=W, N=R.**

17. Fiscal 2013 Defense Appropriations/ Davis-Bacon (H.R. 5856)

Labor's position: Oppose

Rep. King Steve (R-Iowa) offered an amendment that would bar the use of funds to enforce Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements. **Amendment defeated 182-235. Roll Call vote 486. Y=W, N=R.**

18. Regulatory Freeze (H.R. 4078)

Labor's position: Oppose

As part of their so-called "jobs plan," House Republicans offered a bill that would in effect ban any new federal regulations-from job safety to rules for big banks and public health- until the unemployment rate drops to 6 percent or less. The bill would put workers and the public in danger, stopping new safety rules to protect utility workers from electrocution and coal miners from black lung, as well as rules to limit the power of big banks and corporations. **Legislation was approved 245-172. Roll Call vote 536. Y=W, N=R.**

19. Middle Class Tax Cuts (Levin Amendment) (H.R. 8)

Labor's position: Support

While House Republicans pushed to extend the Bush tax cuts for the nation's wealthiest 2 percent, Democrats offered an amendment that would permanently extend tax cuts on income under \$250,000 for joint filers (\$200,000 for individuals), or about 98 percent of taxpayers and 97 percent of small business owners. The Democratic alternative would save the federal government nearly \$1 trillion over the next 10 years; revenue that could be invested in jobs, infrastructure improvements, education, and protecting programs like Medicare and Medicaid, as well as reducing the deficit. **It was defeated 170-257. Roll Call vote 543. Y=R, N=W.**

20. Bush Tax Cuts for the Wealthy (H.R. 8)

Labor's position: Oppose

Not only would the Republican bill extend the Bush tax cuts for the wealthiest 2 percent of taxpayers, H.R. 8 would also raise taxes on approximately 25 million middle and low income households by ending important tax credits for parents raising children and paying for college. Under this plan, the top 2 percent would get an average tax cut of \$150,000 per year. The proposal eliminates programs for low income families, including the refundable tax credit for college tuition, and both the 2009 expansion of the Child Tax Credit and the Earned Income Tax Credit. **The tax cut passed 256-171. Roll Call vote 545. Y=W, N=R.**

21. Republican Tax Cuts for Corporations and the Rich (H.R. 6169)

Labor's position: Oppose

This bill would fast track a Republican plan to overhaul the tax code that would cut taxes for the wealthy and corporations, increase tax incentives for corporations that ship U.S. jobs overseas, raise taxes on the middle class, and increase income inequality and the federal deficit. **The bill passed 232-189. Roll Call vote 552. Y=W, N=R.**

U. S. SENATE BILLS - 2012

1. Surface Transportation Authorization (S. 1813)

Labor's position: Support

The bipartisan "Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Surface Transportation" bill would create millions of transportation infrastructure jobs, boost the economy and fix the nation's crumbling transportation systems. It authorizes \$109 billion over two years for highway, highway safety and public transit programs.

The bill passed 74-22. Roll Call vote 48. Y=R, N=W.

2. Small Business Startup (H.R. 3606)

Labor's position: Oppose

The "Jumpstart Our Business Startups (JOBS) Act" would reduce critical regulatory protections for investors that are essential to safeguarding the retirement savings of America's workers from fraud and other risks. Weakened securities regulations increase the danger of fraud and speculation. **The bill passed 73-26. Roll Call vote 55. Y=W, N=R.**

3. Fair Share Tax Breaks (S. 2330)

Labor's position: Support

The "Paying a Fair Share Act of 2012", sponsored by Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse (D-R.I.), would implement the so-called "Buffett Rule"-a common sense proposition that the effective federal income tax rate for people who make more than \$1 million should be at least 30 percent. **The measure was rejected 51-45. Roll Call vote 65. Y=R, N=W.**

4. Fair Union Election Rules (S.J.R. 36)

Labor's position: Oppose

Last year the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) implemented new democratic union election rules that limited the ability of employers to unfairly delay elections, especially through frivolous and duplicative litigation that previously allowed employers game the system and forced workers to wait months, or even years, before being allowed to vote on joining a union. Sen. Mike Enzi (R-Wyo.)

introduced a resolution to prevent the NLRB from implementing the new fair union election rules. **The motion was rejected 45-54. Roll Call vote 68. Y=W, N=R.**

5. Postal Worker Rights (S. 1789)

Labor's position: Oppose

Sen. Jim DeMint (R-S.C.) offered an amendment to the "21st Century Postal Service Act" that would weaken union representation rights in the workplace. The DeMint amendment would create huge financial burdens on unions by forcing them to spend significant funds on obtaining members signed authorization before participating in worker issue, organizing campaigns and legislative activities at the local, state and national levels. **The amendment was rejected 46-53. Roll Call vote 81. Y=W, N=R.**

6. Rubio "RAISE" Act (S. 3240)

Labor's position: Oppose

Under the guise of "strengthening" workers' collective bargaining rights, Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) offered an amendment to the Farm Bill that would give employers the right to circumvent provisions on wage increases in collective bargaining agreements, supposedly to allow for merit raises. **The amendment was defeated 45-54. Roll Call vote 163. Y=W, N=R.**

7. Bring Jobs Home Act (S. 3364)

Labor's position: Support

With American companies shipping more and more jobs overseas, the United States has lost 6 million manufacturing jobs and seen 50,000 manufacturing plants close in the past decade. The Bring Jobs Home Act would cut taxes for U.S. companies that move jobs and business operations back to the United States, and end tax loopholes that reward companies that ship jobs overseas. Senate **Republicans mounted a filibuster against the bill, however, and a motion to invoke cloture and break the filibuster failed 56-42. Roll Call vote 181. Y=R, N=W.**

8. Bush Tax Cuts for the Wealthy (S. 3412)

Labor's position: Oppose

Legislation from Senate Democrats would allow the Bush tax cuts for the wealthy to expire, while preserving breaks for the middle class. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) offered an amendment to the bill that not only would extend the Bush tax cuts for the top 2 percent but also would extend estate tax cuts for estates worth more than \$5 million. **The McConnell substitute was rejected 45-54: Roll Call vote 183. Y=W, N=R.**

9. Middle Class Tax Breaks (S. 3412)

Labor's position: Support

This Democratic legislation would extend tax cuts on income under \$250,000 for joint filers (\$200,000 for individuals) or about 98 percent of taxpayers as well as 97 percent of small business owners. It would end the Bush tax breaks for the richest 2 percent and save the federal government nearly \$1 trillion over the next 10 years. **The middle class tax cut was passed on July 25 by vote of 51-4. Roll Call vote 184. Y=R, N=W.**

10. Prevailing Wages/Hurricane Sandy Relief (H.R. 1)

Labor's position: Oppose

Sen. Rand Paul (R-Ky.) offered an amendment to the Hurricane Sandy disaster relief bill to bar the use of funds in the bill to administer or enforce prevailing wage requirements under the Davis-Bacon Act for public works project. **The amendment was defeated 42-52. Roll call vote 243. Y=W, N=R.**

11. Hurricane Sandy Relief (H.R. 1)

Labor's position: Support

Passage of the bill that would provide \$60.4 billion in emergency spending for communities hit by Hurricane Sandy. **The bill passed 62-32. . Roll call vote 248. Y=R, N=W.**
